Chief Executive's Report

Joy Reid, Co-founder and CEO

What an incredible year we have had! As I reflect on some of the highlights, I am so deeply honoured that we've been able to support so many mothers and whānau during challenging times. Their stories are what sustain us and provide inspiration for our future endeavours.

A standout moment for me was during our Christmas packing day in December 2023. I had to pinch myself as I looked around the busy team of volunteers and remembered our modest beginnings packing a few dozen bags in a lounge seven years ago. Fast forward to now and our packing days have grown into an efficient operation, and that December day we created 1,800 care packages in a single morning.

Our hardworking team is a mix of generations and stories. One volunteer told me how she received one of our care packages when her 11-day-old was hospitalised with sepsis. It was extraordinarily humbling to think One Mother to Another had been able to be a small part of her journey, and what a privilege it was to have walked beside her in that moment. Her son is now a healthy thriving 18-month-old but she's always remembered how that care package bridged a gap between two strangers and now here she was making care packages for other mothers who'd sat in the same chair she had.

A few key things to celebrate include:

- Expanding into Timaru and Te Nīkau Grey Hospital neonatal units this now means that every mother in a NICU ward across the South Island receives a care package.
- Starting to regularly support Dads who are the primary care-givers in Christchurch and Nelson paediatric wards.
- Growing our care package initiative again, which means we've doubled our reach in just two years.
- Forming new relationships with partners and sponsors to ensure the sustainability of One Mother to Another going forward.

This year, teamwork has been paramount. Our core team has grown to five part-time staff who have excelled, taken on more workload and demonstrated exceptional commitment. I also want to thank our 108 volunteers, who dedicated over 1,900 hours to our cause, and to our generous funders, donors, sponsors, and partners who helped us fill the care packages. A special thanks to our major funders, The Tindall Foundation and the Wright Family Foundation. I extend my deepest gratitude to everyone who is part of the One Mother to Another story.

Teamwork makes the dream work.



Our History and Why To tatou take

One Mother to Another was started in 2016 by two Christchurch mothers (Joy Reid and Christina Buckland), who personally experienced the distress and fear of having a sick child in hospital and became determined to ease the burden of others in that position. From these humble beginnings, One Mother to Another is today an award-winning charity which donates thousands of care packages to mothers and whānau every year across the South Island.

One Mother to Another, lead by Joy Reid as Chief Executive Officer, now provides care packages to every mother in a South Island Neonatal Intensive Care ward and to paediatric medical and surgical wards across a selection of South Island hospitals and three community organisations, as well as encouraging the nursing and medical teams at Christmas.

Research has found that parents of premature babies, (in particular mothers), are at risk of developing higher levels of anxiety, depression, anger and stress. According to the Ministry of Health's Healthy Beginnings report (2012), maternal mental illness in the postpartum period has been shown to have a detrimental effect on the emerging mother-infant and other family and whānau relationships. Research* exploring the needs and coping strategies of parents in this setting discusses how "the neonatal experience is often recounted as emotionally exhausting for parents... many parents felt their needs were overlooked and that offering more mental health resources would be welcomed." One parent from the study recalled "I felt only useful to feed my baby. Their sole concern was for my baby and there was no support offered for me. I feel like that's why I can spontaneously cry when I think about that time, even though my boy is thriving now (Mother, 33 years old)"

Supporting these mothers and whānau, and others in similar situations is our passion and the cornerstone of our mahi.

Our care packs





Our care packs aim to comfort and support mums (and carers) in a vulnerable and distressing time. We try to bridge the gap between two strangers and offer understanding and acknowledgement of their difficulty but mostly we want to put a smile on their face and let them know we care about what they are going through and give them strength to carry on advocating and caring for their child.



Each care pack has three purposes

Practical help

Items to make a hospital stay more comfortable, such as toiletries, tea and coffee. snacks and chocolate which ensure a parent or carer does not have to leave their child's bedside. The packs also include our bespoke gratitude journal which has been designed to help aid mental wellbeing in the hospital setting. Drink bottles, hand cream, lip balm, toothbrush/paste and writing/ colouring items are also included.

Heart

We want mums and carers feel special, loved, appreciated and cared for. One Mother to Another's co-founders spent time in hospital with their young children so they know the vulnerabilities of this time. We want our packs to make people feel valued, seen and understood. Because of this, each pack contains a handwritten note encouragement and handmade crocheted heart.

Something special

We know that in most cases mums and carers put other's needs ahead of their own. We take pride and joy in adding some beautiful 'treat' items in each pack, including one or more gifts ranging from earrings to beauty products. We want to spoil the recipient in a small way and we know these luxuries are greatly appreciated.



One Mother to Another donates care packages to 15 hospital wards and 3 community organisations across Aotearoa

This includes special "Dads" packs to 3 Christchurch paediatric hospital wards, and one Nelson ward each month. Nursing staff also receive Christmas care packs and monthly morning teas during the year.

Our gratitude journal

This year we were excited to be able to redesign and print 12,700 copies (in two print runs) of our bespoke One Mother to Another gratitude journal. We know how difficult it is to stay positive and engaged when faced with a sick child. These beautiful journals aim to encourage, empower and support mothers and carers while they are in hospital with a sick child or baby.

Practicing gratitude is a scientifically proven and powerful way to relieve stress and anxiety. We worked in consultation with "gratitude" design experts, hospital staff and mothers who have been in the hospital environment. Our journal is a beautiful book which serves to teach and remind those who receive it to be grateful, a key component of positive mental health.

Our journal is a multifaceted resource which doubles as a notebook and includes a number of pages helpful in a hospital setting. It can be hugely overwhelming to be faced with all the medical information about your child and to find the strength to understand it all and find a way forward. The journal includes pages for notes and questions so that our mothers/carers can be empowered to be an active part of their child's health journey, and a section for follow up appointments.

At the request of nursing staff, we have also included a "help" section with key contacts for where someone who might be "at risk" or in need of extra support can seek guidance.



Our lives were turned upside down when Grace was seven days old. We went into hospital on the 21st of December. Grace was showing signs of abdominal pain and had high temperatures. The team at Christchurch Hospital promptly admitted us and started the long list of tests. After her second Lumbar Puncture test, they found Grace had meningitis. We were transferred to Children's High Care Unit.

The High Care team looked after us so well for four to five nights. It was very hard to be in hospital with our one-week-old and be away from our son who is nearly two and it made it harder being over the Christmas period. Luckily Grace started to recover on the 27th and we were transferred to the normal children's ward.

A couple night's stay there and we were off home. It was horrible to have to spend Christmas in hospital. But we were so grateful to receive such a lovely gift from your team late on Christmas Eve. It gave us a respite from our situation and took our mind off things for a while. Greatly appreciated. Thanks for all you do.






Income

One Mother to Another is striving to become a sustainable charity long into the future. With that goal in mind, our income streams are diverse.

We have product sponsor partners, run fundraising events, seek grant funding, sell a fundraising cookbook, run crowdfunding campaigns and seek individual and corporate donations.



Grants/ Funding partners remain a key part of our income and support from funding partners this year includes The Tindall Foundation (multi-year grant), The Wright Family Foundation (multi-year grant), Pub Charity, Rātā Foundation, Kiwi Gaming Foundation, Christchurch Casino Charitable Community Trust (CCCCT), Maurice Carter Charitable Trust, One Foundation Ltd, Lottery (COGS), Rano Community Trust - Christchurch, VINCI Foundation New Zealand, Bunnings Riccarton, The Warehouse Riccarton/ Rolleston/ Northlands/ Barrington and, Mitre 10 Mega Hornby.

Corporate sponsorship is an income stream which we are working to increase. Some of our corporate partners donate financially or offer services/ equipment or get involved as volunteers.

Donations are received through our website either as regular individual donors or one-off donations.

Our **Fundraising gala dinner** was held in September 2023 at the Canterbury Club, with guest speaker Sir Stephen Tindall. The dinner was a huge success raising more than \$60,000.

Our Christmas **Crowdfunding campaign** was run with support from The Funding Network's Generosity Generator programme. This was a 12 day crowdfunding campaign where our goal was to raise vital funds for our Christmas care packages. We raised more than \$10,000 with support from 167 donors and five corporate funders who donated \$500 each.
